Former Bafana Bafana captain Lucas "Rhoo" Radebe says the accolades that continue to be bestowed on him should inspire young players to become symbols of the game.

Radebe (45) was one of four African players named in the English Premier League's 100 greatest players ever list compiled by UK newspaper The Daily Telegraph.

The former Leeds United defender was ranked 78th with the Ivory Coast duo of Didier Drogba (15th) and Yaya Touré (19th), and Nigeria's Jay Jay Okocha (93rd), on the list topped by Manchester United legend Ryan Giggs.

The recognition for Radebe came a year short of a decade after his retirement from soccer.

The "Chief", as Radebe is known to the Elland Road faithful, urged the emerging generation of players to "look beyond just playing for Kaizer Chiefs and Bafana.

"Make an impact abroad to become true ambassadors for our country".

In retirement, Radebe said he juggled his demanding ambassadorial duties in the game with family life as a single parent.

He said his efforts to acquire a stake in Leeds - the club he served for 10 years as a player - had not abated, it was still a work in progress.
